Purpose

This report is designed to inform the Port of Tacoma Board of Commissioners of the Port's 2018 record of compliance with federal, state, and local laws, as well as Port policies intended to ensure compliance.

The Port of Tacoma is committed to complying with applicable laws and regulations that govern all aspects of our business, and acting in ways to protect and strengthen the Port's reputation for honesty and responsible stewardship. A voluntary annual compliance report is one method to demonstrate our commitment, recognize deficiencies, and continuously improve.

This is the ninth Compliance Report issued by Port managers and staff to the Commission. Each year, we build on our experiences from the previous year to increase our awareness of applicable laws and regulations and improve our systems for tracking and ensuring compliance.

The annual regulatory compliance report includes:

1. A record of events of non-compliance during 2018, including improvement plans to correct deficiencies and prevent recurrences;
2. The results of internal and third party audits and inspections of Port projects, systems and controls;
3. A progress report on resolving non-compliance issues from 2017; and
4. Compliance improvement plans for 2019.

Background

Port Overview – The Port of Tacoma is an independent municipal corporation operating under state law. The Port was created by Pierce County, Washington, citizens in 1918. It includes approximately 2,700 acres of uplands and aquatic area

within Pierce County and the City of Tacoma, including 33 miles of shoreline abutting Commencement Bay and the Puyallup River.

The Port owns and maintains facilities related to maritime commerce, including facilities for containerized cargo, automobiles, and dry bulks such as grain, breakbulk cargo, heavy-lift cargo and project cargoes. It also leases real estate to several business sectors such as warehousing/distribution, manufacturing, and commercial/office that support and complement maritime commerce or water-dependent uses.

In August 2015, the Port partnered with the Port of Seattle to form The Northwest Seaport Alliance. The alliance now manages most of the two ports' container and breakbulk marine cargo facilities and business, providing a unified, regional portfolio of terminals to leverage strategic investments and meet changing customer needs.

The Port is governed by five commissioners who set policy and direction, and approve all major expenditures. The five commissioners, together with the five Port of Seattle commissioners, serve as the governing body for The Northwest Seaport Alliance. The Commission appoints the chief executive officer, who is responsible for leading the Port and overseeing a staff of approximately 213 employees. The Commission also appoints the Port's treasurer, deputy treasurer, auditor, and deputy auditor.

Regulatory Environment – The Port is classified as a special purpose district, and operates under Title 53 of the Revised Code of Washington. In addition to this state law, the Port's administrative, operational and business functions adhere to nearly 200 laws administered by more than 70 federal, state and local governmental entities and two tribes. This includes laws that address environ-

mental protection, facility planning and construction, personnel management, labor relations, procurement, contract management, financial management, real estate transactions, safety and security, public disclosure, records management, training, payment of taxes, providing wages and benefits, and more.

Appendix A includes a table that lists pertinent laws that apply to Port programs and activities.

In addition, the Port has adopted its own policies and procedures to help Port employees comply with applicable laws/ regulations and follow best practices in the following areas¹.

Port employees in all departments are responsible for adhering to these policies, as well as the laws, regulations, and ethical standards that apply to Port business and operations.

Reporting Methodology

The Port utilizes a system to report and track compliance issues as they occur, designate the department lead, and collect and retain relevant documents. The reported information is reviewed with the Management Team at regular intervals. After year-end, all directors sign a representation letter acknowledging the importance and their intention

2018 Compliance Results

Unless an exception is noted within this report, the Port has complied with the laws that govern our activities in 2018 to the best understanding of department directors. Exceptions in 2018 included: (1) Citation for an alleged unsafe ladder, (2) Citation for expired pH buffers, (3) Citation for improperly labeled totes containing waste filter press cake, (4) Missed deadline for treatment system installation, and (5) Expired “Certificate of Adequacy” permit. The remaining results indicate several less formal compliance actions, as well as less serious issues stemming from regular audits and inspections.

(1) Citation for an alleged unsafe ladder – Labor and Industries issued a serious citation on January 10, 2018 following an employee complaint regarding an alleged unsafe ladder. The Port appealed the citation, and an informal conference with LNI was held on February 21, 2018. The ladder was removed from service. LNI issued the Corrective Notice of Redetermination on May 7th, affirming the citation and penalty. The Port declined to appeal further, and paid the penalty.

Improvement Plan: Continue safety audits and workplace safety inspections.

(2) Citation for expired pH buffers – pH buffers in the wastewater treatment room were expired. Outdated chemicals were removed from use.

Improvement Plan: Perform self-audits regularly.

(3) Citation for improperly labeled tote containing waste filter press cake – Tote containing waste filter press cakes was not properly labeled. Tote has been properly labeled.

to develop and update appropriate policies and keep them posted within a web-based administrative manual.

Improvement Plan: Perform self-audits regularly.

(4) West Sitcum Terminal Stormwater Treatment System – In June 2018, the successful bidder for the treatment system installation identified their schedule for substantial completion as January 31, 2019. Ecology and the Port were in an agreed order where the installation deadline was actually 9-30-2018. This would result in \$90,000 in stipulated penalties. Staff worked on an extension request with the Washington Department of Ecology and received three total extensions. As of 4/18/2019, the basin treatment deadlines are as follows:

Basin A	Operating
Basin B	No extension/overdue
Basin C	July 31, 2019

The delays in contractor schedule included contamination in Basin A and February snow. Basin B is not yet on line. The contractor speculates that they will have the system on line in mid-May 2019.

Improvement Plan: Remove as much time from the schedule as possible.

(5) Expired “Certificate of Adequacy” permit – The Port was out of compliance with the Coast Guard / Department of Homeland Security ‘Certificate of Adequacy’. This allows for garbage and oil offloading from ships at T7 and EB1. The permit expired in August 2018. New permit was renewed the end of 2018 and is valid through 11-09-23.

Improvement Plan: Use CRM to highlight expiration dates.

External Audits

As a public entity responsible for stewardship of public funds, the Port is subject to regular, independent audits by the State Auditor’s Office and other third party entities. Two independent audits were conducted on Port activities in 2018. (See Table 1, Page 4.)

Third-Party Inspections

Environmental

Several regulatory agencies visited Port sites or projects on compliance inspections. (See Table 2, page 4.)

Facilities Maintenance

1. Kurt W. Marx
Quarterly waste water sample, maintenance shop – **All samples were good.**
2. Ace Fire
Annual fire alarm confidence testing for Port buildings – **All passed.**
3. Sigma Six
Substation, switch gear testing – **Work is on-going, some substations need more work to be done.**

Equipment Maintenance

1. We purchased our own load bank and now test our own generators. Third party testing no longer required – **All passed.**
2. Mobility Concepts
Crane elevators and safety devices inspection – **All passed.**
3. Delcon Crane Certifiers
Load test cranes, spreaders, lifts and strads – **All passed except Strad 1542 that has been taken out of service and mothballed.**

Progress Report – Unresolved Compliance Issues

There are no unresolved compliance issues from 2017.

2019 Compliance Program

The Port will continue to implement those compliance programs put into place in preceding years, including developing and updating relevant Port policies, providing proper training for our employees, tracking and reporting on our compliance activities, and monitoring ongoing obligations.

In 2019, the Port of Tacoma will track all compliance activities associated with the homeport and the South Harbor activities now licensed to Northwest Seaport Alliance. Staff from the homeports of Tacoma and Seattle, in conjunction with the NWSA, will evaluate options to continue reporting compliance activities for the homeport of Tacoma and the NWSA.

Conclusion

The Port of Tacoma is committed to complying with applicable laws and regulations that govern all aspects of our business. We continue to implement programs to prevent incidents of non-compliance that are in our control and to support compliance with our tenants. We have a good record of compliance with applicable laws and regulations in 2018, and where we've fallen short we've taken steps to quickly resolve identified issues.
