

## *Port of Tacoma*

### *Proclamation 2022-01-PT*

*WHEREAS, the Port of Tacoma has adopted a Diversity and Inclusion Policy which declares the Port respects and values the rich diversity of its employees, customers, contractors and stakeholders and that it is committed to a work environment that is inclusive and values diverse thought and expression in pursuit of the organization's mission and is committed to provide a workplace environment that is free from all forms of discrimination and harassment; and*

*WHEREAS, Port of Tacoma Resolution 2020-06 identifies diversity, equity, and inclusion as core values that the Port of Tacoma shall incorporate into its Strategic Plan and into Diversity, Equity and Inclusion initiatives; and*

*WHEREAS, the Port of Tacoma acknowledges and deplores the history of systemic racism in the United States; and*

*WHEREAS, Port of Tacoma Resolution 2020-06 adopts the following guiding principles as the basis for the Port of Tacoma's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion initiatives: undoing and understanding the history of racism, embracing differences, and developing leadership; and*

*WHEREAS, on April 16, 2021, the Port of Tacoma Commission approved a new strategic plan, which contained strategies calling on the Port to integrate the values of diversity, equity and inclusion, as well as health and safety, into the Port's culture and decision-making framework; and*

*WHEREAS, Black History Month grew out of the establishment, in 1926, of Negro History Week by Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of African American Life and History; and*

*WHEREAS, in 1976, President Gerald Ford issued the first Black History Month proclamation, calling upon the Americans to celebrate this observance each February; and*

*WHEREAS, during Black History Month, we celebrate the many achievements and contributions made by Black Americans to our economic, cultural, spiritual, and political development; and*

*WHEREAS, from the Revolutionary War through the abolitionist movement, to marches from Selma to Montgomery and across America today, Black Americans have remained steadfast to the proposition that all of us are created equal, even when their own rights were denied; and*

*WHEREAS, the observance of Black History Month calls our attention to the continued need to battle racism on all levels of our society and build a society that lives up to its democratic ideals.*

*NOW, THEREFORE, the Port of Tacoma recognizes February 2022, as National Black History Month and calls upon the people of Pierce County to recognize the achievements of the Black American community, to celebrate the great diversity of the American people, and to continue our efforts to create a world that is more just, peaceful, and prosperous for all.*
